Need and want to

- We use **need + noun** to talk about things.
- For example:

I need a new T-shirt.

- We use **want to + verb** to talk about actions.
- For example:

I want to go shopping.

I want to go shopping because I need a new T-shirt.

Look at the images. What do John and Jane want to do? What do they need?

Would like (to)

- We use "would like + noun" to ask for something politely.
We use "would like to + verb" to say we want to do something politely.
- **For example:**
I would like a cup of coffee.
I would like to buy some bread.
- **Question form:**
Would you like a cup of coffee?

Customer

- Hello.
- I would like a cup of tea.
- A sandwich, please.
- Thank you. How much is it?
- Here you are.
- Goodbye!



Waiter

- Hello. How can I help you?
- Alright. Anything else?
- Here you are.
- It's 5 dollars.
- Thank you. Goodbye!

You are in a bakery. You want to buy some bread.
